CAREER DAY

The original Career Day was started in the spring of 1987 by Sally Pace, Dennis Conner and Pearl Clarke who had started working in the Counseling office with Mercy Herrera, the Migrant Education Counselor. The Counseling staff came up with the idea to invite alumni to come and talk after many students would come into counseling saying "I can not do thus and so or go to such and so college because I am from Woodlake High." We decided the best way for our students to see the connection to great colleges and career opportunities was to hear directly from people with the same high school experience.

The first Career Day was a half-day event starting with a Key Note address by Dr. Frank Clarke. The day was organized by FHA-HERO members with Cuca Carretero Atherton and Billie Shaver Merlo serving as the first student chairpersons. Maribel Rivas Rodriguez and her crew catered the event. The event has grown to an entire day and now has eight student committees and involves almost all parts of the student body.

Career Day is organized by a student steering committees guided by Head Counselor Carmita Peña, class of 1996. This year's Career Day Student Chairpersons are Jordan Vieira and Ben Pfenniger. Students involved in Career Day work all year planning the event. These students are in charge of overseeing the rescheduling of the entire student body for one day, inviting presenters, and helping organize eight student committees. They do an outstanding job coordinating this event - from the planning process through the final thank you letters.

This issue of the Woodlake High School Foundation Newsletter will feature several of our alumni who have been involved with Career Day from it's inception. We have asked them to tell us a little about what they are doing now and their thoughts about their experience with Career Day. This year's event is October 24th and will again feature our Alumni as presenters. Career Day starts out with a Key Note speaker in the gym; students attend five different presentations on careers throughout the day.

Little did I know that the work I did for Woodlake High's first career day during my senior year would some day be my future! I was a typical high school freshman who only went to the counseling office to pick up my schedule or change a class. All that changed when my FHA advisor, Sally Pace, became a counselor. I found myself hanging out in her office more and more. Billie Shaver and I were



her personal assistants. Keeping her desk in organized piles and finding her something to write with were our two essential jobs. When she asked us to help with Career Day, we thought this lady must be nuts if she's looking to start another project, but what the heck! I can recall endless hours at the computer or on the phone. I learned from this experience that being a Woodlake High School student did not limit my career choices. I decided then to major in Psychology. In May of 1994, I graduated from CSU, Fresno with a MA in Education and a Pupil Personnel Service Credential. I had become a counselor (Sally Pace, Jr.) I even managed to use Career Day as my Master's Thesis. I created a handbook on how to put together a career day or fair for high school students. I also did my internship at Woodlake Schools. I had more hands on experience at being a counselor than a lot of my peers. It didn't take long before I was hired.

I began my career in August of 1994, at Corcoran High School where I was the Migrant counselor. As my family is my number one priority, later that year I accepted a counseling position closer to home at Golden West High School in Visalia. I was a counselor for 13 years. Last year, I again followed Sally's lead and became an administrator. I am currently the Assistant Principal of Student Services at Golden West. I am forever grateful for the mentorship and work ethic Sally instilled in me. Helping to plan and organize the first Career Day at Woodlake taught me to set goals and follow my heart. I have a wonderful family and a great career. I am married to Sam Atherton (also a Woodlake graduate), have a daughter, Samantha, who is 10 years old, and a son, Nathan, who is five. As chaotic as my life can be, I look forward to each day's challenges. I enjoy being a wife, mother and an educator.

As a young high school student, when I was first assigned the task of co-chairing the 1st Career Day at Woodlake High school, I viewed the job as just something else I had to do for Mrs. Pace before I graduated. I honestly had no idea that I was going to be part of something that would grow and flourish long after I left Woodlake. That first career day was fairly small. I remember recruiting my own parents to participate! With the support of people

within the community, it was a success. It was also great to be able to work with Cuca Carretero Atherton.

I grew up amongst many facets of Agriculture. My father, Bill Shaver was a horse shoer. My sisters and I raised pigs, sheep, and steers for our 4-H and FFA projects. In the summers, my mother would work in one of the local packing houses sorting peaches and nectarines. Public Speaking, however, was the biggest life skill that I developed while in FHA, and it has proven very beneficial over the years. After graduating from Woodlake High in 1987, I attended California State University, Fresno. Majoring in Plant Production, I met my husband, Harry, in a Plant Genetics class our Junior year of college. Upon graduating from CSU, Fresno, Harry and I moved to the North Coast of California where he took over operations of his family vineyards and winery. We have 200 acres of premium wine grapes in the Dry Creek Valley of Sonoma County. For many years, Jon played in the Poison Oak men's summer softball league in Three Rivers. He also played softball at Visalia's Plaza Park. One of Jon's best memories, about which he always enjoyed telling stories, was when he was 12 and backpacked across the Sierra with his dad and Larry Britten of Three Rivers. They departed from Mineral King and hiked east to Whitney Portal, a distance of more than 70 miles. Jon was a dog person and loved his black Labradors, Duke, who died earlier this vear, and Jake, who was with Jon in the auto accident and didn't survive. He could often be found at the river, swimming with his dogs. In March 2008, Jon met Katherine (Katie) Vargus and her little dog, Cloe. Jon and Katie soon became engaged and had plans to marry March 28, 2009, in Shell Beach. He was looking

forward to marriage and starting a family. According to Jon's mom and dad, Connie and Wayne, he was a wonderful son, fiancé, and friend. He also enjoyed all his coworkers he met while employed with Caltrans. Jon was preceded in death by his grandparents, Orville and Gert Lentz and Cotton and Vera Applegate. He is survived by his mother and father, Connie and Wayne Lentz of Three Rivers; his fiancée, Katie Vargus, who had recently moved to Three Rivers; his aunt and uncle, Linda and Dewey Woollum of Pasco, Wash.; five cousins, Nikke Costa and son Nicholas of Washington, Deena Andrews and husband Curtis and their four daughters, Kristin, Jannelle, Aisley, and Josie of Missouri, Scott Applegate of Palm Springs, Todd Woollum and wife Diana and children Elise and Elijah of Washington, and Mary Lynn Woollum of Washington.
