

WOODLAKE HIGH SCHOOL - HALL OF FAME INDUCTEES




Frank Ainley - *WHS Class of 1951 - Taught & Coached at WHS*

If anyone is worthy of being in the Woodlake Hall of Fame it is Frank Ainley. He is the only one of this first group of Hall of Fame inductees who hits all of the criteria landmarks. He is a graduate of Woodlake High in 1951. He worked as a teacher and coach at Woodlake High in the 1970's until his retirement in 2006. He has been an outstanding representative of all things Tiger for nearly his entire life in every element of his activities. Frank would be the first to tell you that it is the spirit of Woodlake that makes him do what he does. He claims "Once a Tiger, Always a Tiger" is not only a catchy phrase but it is a way of life. You are never a stranger once you became a Tiger. Frank's work on the field of athletics or in the classroom makes him one of those teachers you never forget. Along with his beloved wife Barbara, they had 4 children who attended Woodlake High School and who all still live in the local area. If you don't know Frank just find him and get acquainted with him but be advised, chisel out a little time because he is going to get to know you and you are going to get a good dose of Tiger common sense. Which is going to take a while.

Louise Achenbach *Taught & Coached at WHS*


What do you do when you live in South Dakota and graduate from college with a teaching credential? In the case of Louise Achenbach, you come to small California town and you start teaching. Along the way the administration asked her to coach. She coached tennis, a sport she knew nothing about and that led to volleyball and other sports. Her teams' domination in the sport of volleyball is legendary in Tulare County. Line up any Yosemite division school and her teams would beat them. It came from hard work and attention to detail. The classroom is also something she loved. When students recall what they learned from her in class they speak of life lessons and important personal insights through great discussions of events of the day. Mix common sense, hard work, personal integrity and good old South Dakota hospitality and you get Louise Achenbach. Thinking about Woodlake in the 1970's through the first decade of the 21st century without thinking of her imprint into the sands of student life is near impossible. Her influence will go on through her former students, now adults, and how they raise their children. It is impossible to calculate her influence on her students and athletes; just know that she is worthy of her selection into the Hall of Fame.



Leo Robinson *Taught & Coached at WHS*

Coach Robinson began coaching and teaching at Woodlake High School in 1959 straight out of Fresno State College. He held many positions in his 43 years teaching at Woodlake High but his main position was physical education. He was also baseball coach for 27 years, football coach for 41 years, and athletic director. His obvious achievements are inscribed in record books: 290 football victories, 3rd all time among coaches in California and number 1 in the Valley, his induction into the California Football Hall of Fame in 2002, but he contributed so much more- the lasting effect he had on so many young people's lives, the lessons on teamwork, sportsmanship, and character building. He showed them they could make a difference and that they could achieve so much more than they ever thought possible. You don't spend 43 years in coaching without loving sports. You don't spend 43 years teaching without loving teenagers. You don't spend 43 years in a town of 7,000 without loving the community. Coach Robinson was a true tiger.

Woodlake High School Foundation has established a Hall of Fame. The dinner will be April 20th 2018 at the Woodlake Veterans Memorial Building.

Former students with at least two years at Woodlake High School, former Woodlake High School staff members including teachers, administrators, counselors, high school support staff, past superintendents, and former board members, are all eligible for nomination. A student candidate is eligible once their graduating class is five years out of high school. Former staff members, board members, and administrators are eligible if they worked for Woodlake a minimum of 10 years and have been retired from Woodlake for at least four years.



After having served

students as a teacher for 11 years, Jesús assumed leadership roles as migrant coordinator, then area administrator for the Tulare County Office of Education, Migrant Education Department. His responsibilities encompassed working with multiple school districts in Kings and Tulare Counties to ensure equity in educational opportunities for K-12 students.

Jesús serves on the Center for Leadership, Equity and Research (CLEAR) Advisory Board, a non-profit organization, and is a member of its 2020 Strategic Planning Task Force Team. In these roles, Jesús volunteers his time on educational issues impacting the Central Valley and state in the areas of social justice and equity. Jesús is also the Co-Founder of College for Me (C4ME), a not-for-profit organization that focuses on preparing students from underrepresented communities in applying to and attending selective universities such as, Yale, Stanford, UCLA, etc. He and his wife, Dr. Adriana Cervantes-González created this organization for the purpose of providing student-centered college knowledge and leadership seminars to a diverse population of students in the Visalia area and surrounding communities. The primary purpose of the seminars is to expose academically high achieving students from underrepresented backgrounds to the idea that selective colleges and universities are within reach.

During his free time, Jesús enjoys spending quality time with his wife of nearly 18 years, Adriana, and their four children; Neftaly, Diego, Joaquin, and Carlos. 


Youth of the Year

PRINCIPAL'S MESSAGE

Conditions that Foster College & Career Readiness

As we progress through the school year, we are constantly reminded that with just the right learning conditions, students can produce quality work that is relevant, connected to the real world, and allow opportunities to develop fundamental skills that are essential for success in college and career life. Engaging students in Project-Based Learning (PBL) and Performance Tasks (PT's) are some ways to create conditions that foster college and career readiness.

In a web article written by the Buck Institute of Education, *Project-Based Learning* is defined as a teaching method in which students gain knowledge and skills by working for an extended period of time to investigate and respond to an authentic, engaging and complex question, problem, or challenge. Educator Jay McTighe, states that a *performance task* is an activity or assessment that asks students to *perform* or demonstrate their knowledge, understanding and proficiency. Performance tasks yield a tangible product and/or performance that serve as evidence of learning.

So what are students at Woodlake High School doing in relation to PBL and PT's? By taking a stroll through the Ag Department Building, you will come across student-made fire pits, bird houses, barbeque grills, and metal decor. Take a few steps to the back of the Ag Building and you will find a new walk-in cooler that houses flowers and greenery used by the Floral Class to create made-to-order arrangements for any occasion. In English classes, simply writing a position essay is not enough. Students are choosing topics relevant to themselves, using multiple sources of information, providing textual evidence to support their claims and communicating their positions through oral class presentations. In Math classes, scenarios are presented that require students to apply their math knowledge to solve problems and communicate their solutions. In one recent unit of study, students learned about the variety of ways to visually present data

such as in a bar graph, line graph or circle graph. Students then developed a relevant question to ask their peers, conducted a survey, and then presented the data they collected using one of the graphs they learned. In Science classes, it is very common to see students working together to make predictions, test hypothesis and experiment. Building a car that integrates a mouse trap as its energy source and then applying principles of physics to calculate motion has been an annual project in the AP Physics class. In US History classes, students are going beyond just learning about the political influences imposed by the journalistic styles used in newspapers during the

1920's. Students are instead developing an understanding by creating their very own newspaper that emphasizes those particular features. In electives classes such as Art, Video Production, Band, Drama and Dance, students are tuning into their creativity, producing quality pieces of art and providing choreographed performances for different audiences. What if you had an opportunity to take a plot of land and create a Rose Garden for the community of Woodlake? How would you begin the project? What would the Rose Garden look like? What materials would you need? How much would the project cost? The creation of a Rose Garden was an actual project that was assigned to a group of 10th grade student enrolled in the Academy of Ag. Working in teams, students answered these types of questions and developed unique proposals for this Rose Garden. All proposals were reviewed by a panel. The winning Rose Garden design will be built in the near future at the school farm.

Through a recent review of student grades at WHS, results are indicating that a significant number of students that are academically successful, confident and socially outgoing have been enrolled in classrooms that have embraced PBL and PT's. In these types of classrooms, skills such as working collaboratively, being creative, thinking critically to solve problems and communicating effectively are encouraged. These skills are at the heart of college and career readiness and as noted above, are fostered in many classrooms at WHS.

A NOTE FROM OUR SUPERINTENDENT


District-wide WiFi almost here!

The WUSD Board of Trustees approved the budget to allow district-wide WiFi for all students in the Woodlake Unified School District. The first tower was erected on February 16 at the Nutritional Services Warehouse. Three more towers will be installed, one at the Performing Arts Building on the WHS campus, another at our school farm, and a third at Stone Corral Elementary School in Seville.

Our high school seniors should be able to check out laptop computers to take home this spring. They will be our first rollout. Teachers are excited about the ability of students to achieve more in a 21st century learning environment. We expect all of our WUSD students to have the

ability to check out laptops to keep with them throughout the year beginning in the fall.

On a different note, our Board of Trustees approved a loan of \$1M at 0% interest to place solar panels on our Maintenance, Operations and Transportation building. The dollars saved from our district's electricity bill will pay for our loan. We expect to own the solar panels in 12 years.

IRENE BARBA - HIKES INTO RETIREMENT

Irene Barba - *Class of 1978*, returned to Woodlake High in 2011 with a TCOE Satellite Class for students with intellectual disabilities teacher, founded the Tiger Fusion Club and is a hero to many staff members at WHS for her service to them through "Special Brew," a vocational training opportunity in which the students in her class make and serve coffee. Irene had the opportunity to kick off her recent retirement by hiking the Pacific Crest Trail. Here is a brief overview.

"I started on April 6, 2016 from Campo, on the Mexican border. Often times, I carried a pack that weighed 50+ pounds because I needed at least two gallons (16 pounds) of water for many of the hot sweltering days and or the nearest water was beyond the scope of my hiking day. My personal record for mileage in a day in the southern California section was 31 miles and often times, I was hiking 20 to 27 miles a day. I encountered all kinds of weather: rain, snow, wind as well as thunder and lightning. I slept in a small cave just before reaching my first one hundred miles. I had already been hiking into the night to gain elevation and make my miles for the day, so I was dubbed Bat Woman by fellow hikers. I set out alone and I spent most of my time hiking and camping on my own throughout my journey. I made great friends along the trail, but the true opportunity to meet folks was during my resupplies in the small towns along the way.

I made it to Kennedy Meadows (702 miles) before Memorial Day and skipped the Sierra. I always intended to skip the Sierra as I have experienced winter snow camping and never want to be that cold again. High water run-off was another concern and since I was hiking alone, I decided to skip it and return to do the Sierra heading south in the fall.

I started out of Sierra City north in mid-June and started having issues with my right foot due to a prior foot surgery, and it was exacerbated with the excessive weight and compounded daily miles. I went to the Shasta Hospital Emergency room and the ER doctor sent me home. This was an extremely frustrating time for me, I proceeded to be on and off the trail through July. I finally saw my podiatrist and he made me a corrective orthotic that allowed me to continue. I had completed most of northern California by this

time. So, to get back on my timeline and get to Washington before the bad weather, I skipped Oregon and started up in Washington. I did two large sections from Cascade Locks to White Pass which included the Goat Rocks Wilderness and the Knife's Edge. I then skipped up to Steven's Pass to Stehekin and did the Mt Adams and Glacier Peak Wilderness Areas. The majority of the Washington hike was spectacular. My longest and last hiking day in Washington was 32 miles and my maximum pack weight was 35 pounds. I did not have one rainy day during my Washington section. Hallelujah!

After flying out of Stehekin on a float plane, I jumped back down to the Sierra and headed south from Truckee after Labor Day. As I journeyed south, the backcountry was transitioning into fall and it was beautiful. My daughter joined me at Tuolumne Meadows to do the John Muir Trail section on September 20th. By this time, we were experiencing fall in all its glory. We hiked this last section in thirteen days and completed 220 miles, which included a trip up Mt. Whitney. Hiking with my daughter would be the highlight of my six month journey. Becky and I hiked out to the Cottonwood Trail Head south of Mt. Whitney on October 3rd, 2016. Of the 2,650 mile Pacific Crest Trail, I completed 1,700 miles."
