ANNUAL CAREER DAY - KEYNOTE SPEAKER

Pedro López, an AB 540 student, arrived in the United States in 1999 not knowing one word of English. His mother, Ereyda Jaimes, always motivated him to excel in school and to pursue a higher education. Pedro's first day of 8th grade was the beginning of a new life. He showed up to school with a manila folder, a few sheets of lined paper, a pen, and a lot of confusion because he did not understand a word the teachers said. Even though he struggled with the language, he was active and joined wrestling and flag football.

Pedro's high school era was the foundation for his higher education. From 2000 to 2004, Woodlake High School pro-

vided him with a safe learning environment where he was able to grow, develop, and improve his English Language skills. During his freshman year, Pedro focused on his English as a Second Language (ESL) classes to learn and improve his English. He also joined the guitar class where his passion for music started. He was part of this class throughout all four years. Pedro's hard work began to pay off when he was placed in regular English classes starting his sophomore year. Moreover, he joined soccer and played as a goalkeeper for three years. In his junior and senior years, Pedro was placed in College Prep English classes, where he passionately enjoyed reading literature. In addition, during his sophomore, junior, and senior years, Pedro attended three Migrant Leadership Academies at SCICON where he gained valuable information about higher education, developed his leadership skills, networked with other students, and met personnel from Fresno State who would later become his mentors. The support and assistance from teachers, counselors, and staff at Woodlake High School pushed and motivated Pedro to continue with his education. The kid from Mexico who showed up with just some paper and a pen the first day of school was ready to graduate from high school. Playing the national anthem on the electric guitar at graduation is one of his greatest memories.

Since completing high school in 2004, Pedro has continued his educational and professional journey. In the fall of 2004, Pe-

dro attended Fresno City College, and at the same time enrolled in a Flamenco Guitar class at Fresno State. In the spring of 2005, Pedro enrolled as a full-time student at Fresno State. For the first two years of college, Pedro adapted to a new life once again. His passion for music led him to major in Music. He also wanted to help high school ESL students in the future so he double majored in Linguistics and Music. From 2005 to 2014, Pedro worked for English Language Development summer residential programs for high school students at Fresno State through the College Assistance Migrant Program (CAMP) where he implemented the skills and teaching tech-

niques that he learned in his linguistics classes. From 2007 to 2015 Pedro worked in an Elementary School coordinating an educational after school program for about 95 students. From 2007 to 2015, Pedro volunteered with the Education and Leadership Foundation in community events, student conferences, professional development conferences, fundraisers, and the Leadership Academies at SCICON. In 2014, Pedro graduated from Fresno State with a bachelor's degree in Linguistics (Teaching English as a Second Language) and a minor in Music. In 2015, Pedro began working for the Education and Leadership Foundation (ELF) where he is currently the Director of Educational Programs. Being in this position has allowed him to continue to serve K-12 and college students through the services, educational programs, and opportunities that ELF offers. Planning and coordinating the Leadership Academies at SCICON has been a big accomplishment for Pedro. Remembering himself attending these Leadership Academies as a high school student back in 2002 motivates him to continue improving, innovating, and providing programs like this for students. Daily, Pedro continues to improve professionally doing the work that he loves. His future academic and professional plans include attending grad school to pursue a master's degree in education and an administrative credential so that he can continue to serve the community and to continue to be a role model for our youth.

Tiger Football - STRONGER than EVER! - Feel the Roar!!!





WHS Hall of Fame Nominate Your Candidate

The Woodlake High School Foundation established a Hall of Fame for its distinguished staff and alumni. **The Foundation Spring Dinner, May 1, 2020** will host the fourth induction class into the

newly established Woodlake High School Hall of Fame. Candidates are eligible based on their contributions

in areas such as academics, the community, athletics, professional occupations, and the arts. Any person may nominate a candidate to the

Woodlake High School Hall of Fame.

Once a name has been placed in nomination, it will be kept on file to be considered in later years. Former students with at least two years at Woodlake High School, former Woodlake High School staff members including teachers, administrators, counselors, high school support staff, past superintendents, and former board members, are all eligible for nomination.

A student candidate is eligible once their graduating class is five years out of high school.

Former staff members, board members, and administrators are eligible if they worked for Woodlake a minimum of 10 years and have been retired from Woodlake for at least four years.

WHS Hall of Fame 2019 Honoree



Ned Baker WHS 2019 Hall of Fame Inductee

Ned was born October 5, 1919 in Pomona, California and was the only son of Glenn and Nita Ferris Baker. He was raised on the family citrus ranch west of Woodlake, attended Woodlake Union High School, College of the Sequoias, and graduated with a BS in marketing from the Uni-

versity of California, Berkeley. He was the founder of Glenita Ranches in Woodlake and a partner in Visalia Citrus Packing Group.

Ned's commitment to local education began when he was elected the Woodlake Union High School Board of Trustees in 1950. He subsequently served as member and president of the Tulare-County School Boards Association, on California School Boards Association as a representative of Tulare and Kern Counties, and as president of the Tulare County Academic Decathlon committee. Baker served another 30 years on the College of Sequoias Board of Trustees from 1967-1996.

Ned participated in numerous civic activities throughout his life and was honored as "Woodlake Man of the Year" in 1963. He served on the Board of Directors of Agricultural Producers for 25 years and as Chairman of the Board for over a decade. He served on the Board of Directors of the Tulare County Lemon Association for 15 years. In 1997 he was inducted into the COS Hall of Fame in recognition of outstanding achievement.

During one period he served on nine different boards of directors at the same time. He was also a Past President of the Woodlake Rotary Club.

Ned also provided leadership in the citrus business, serving on the board of directors of the Tulare County Lemon Association, as chairman of Agriculture Producers, and as a member of the Navel Orange, Valencia Orange, and Lemon Administrative Committees. In 1976, he was appointed by the governor to represent citrus growers on the State Board of Food and Agriculture. He later became the face and voice of Sunkist Growers through a series of TV and radio commercials broadcast in the U.S. and England.

Ned and his wife, Karyll, had three children and three grandchildren that are WHS graduates: sons Jeff 1961, Terry 1965 and his

wife Sally Dudley Baker 1976, Craig and wife Becky Walters Baker 1975 and their children Kyle 2002, Jennifer 2003, and Ryan 2007. Ned and Karyll were two of the founding members of the St. Clements Anglican Church in Woodlake. Both were active leaders in the ministry of the church, working to build the St. Clements Day Care Center to serve the community. Ned passed away January 24, 2010.



WHS Hall of Fame - 2019 Honorees



George Clausen WHS 2019 Hall of Fame Inductee

George Gerald Clausen was born in the Woodlake Hospital on June 25, 1929, to George and Etta Lulu (Ragle) Clausen. He grew up in the Naranjo area and attended Woodlake Elementary School from 1935-1943 and Woodlake High School from 1943-1947. After high school he attended Visalia College (C.O.S.) from 1947-1949 and then the University of California, Berkeley from 1949-1951. On June 15, 1951, he enlisted in the U.S. Air Force as

an airman before entering the Aviation Cadet Training Program. He graduated from pilot training on October 25, 1952, and was commissioned as a 2nd Lieutenant. However, he was only one of three in his class that were offered a regular commission into the Air Force. He served as a pilot in the F-80, F-84, F-86, F-100, F-105, and F-111 aircraft. Over his career he completed Squadron Officer's School, Armed Forces Staff College, and the Air War College. He flew combat over North Vietnam (100 missions in Operation Rolling Thunder) and during that tour was Commander of the 34th Tactical Fighter Squadron. He was based at Korat Royal Thai Air Force Base. All operations were over North Vietnam or were in support of CIA operations in Laos. Later he served in NATO and was Director of Fighter Operations for USAF Europe. His last assignment was Director of Plans for 9th Air Force (Tactical Air Command).

Over the span of his career, he was stationed in France, Germany, Thailand, Arizona, Nevada, Virginia, Alabama, and South Carolina. He has been decorated with the Silver Star twice, the Legion of Merit twice, the Distinguished Flying Cross three times, and the Air Medal sixteen times, among many other commendations and service medals.

While he was stationed at Williams AFB, he met his wife Ruth Hess in Phoenix, Arizona. They were married on January 4, 1957 in Mesa, Arizona. They raised four children: Margaret, George Henry, Nancy, and Kathy, while living the nomadic life of a military family, traveling all over the United States and Europe. Nancy graduated from Woodlake Union High School in 1979 and is teaching 3rd grade at Castle Rock Elementary in Woodlake. Kathy graduated from Woodlake Union High School in 1980 and is a supervisor for the State of California's Department of Weights and Measures. Margaret is retired from UPS. Ruth and George Henry are both deceased. George is blessed with five grandchildren.

After retirement from the USAF after 26 years in 1977, he moved back to where he was born and raised in Woodlake. He became an orange grower again, farming the grove that his grandfather planted in 1905. He was asked to teach at The College of the Sequoias in 1980. Since his major at UC Berkeley was Soil Science, he taught the Soils, Fertilizers, Economic Entomology, Citrus, Irrigation, and Forage Crop Science classes. In 1990, he quit teaching at COS to devote himself to fulltime farming.

He learned community service from his grandfather and father, who both

served as school board members in Woodlake. He was a founding member of the WHS Foundation. At nearly 90, he still serves as president of the Woodlake Cemetery Board and as an Elder at the Lemon Cove Community Church. He is a member of the Tulare County Farm Bureau Land Use Committee and participates in a local committee devoted to measuring wells and collecting data on local water levels.

In his free time, he still oversees the management of the grove, meets for coffee with his friends every morning, enjoys solitaire, and mentors a young man that attends a private school in the area.





Earl McKee WHS 2019 Hall of Fame Inductee

Born and raised in Three Rivers, Earl McKee has led a diverse and fascinating life. Earl's father started the family mule packing business in 1910, later buying the park concessions for packing and riding stables in Giant Forest, Sequoia National Park. Earl spent all his summers of his early life in the back country. He raised cattle, and quarter horses. He has sung at uncountable

weddings and funerals sang western music with his family; playing his Tuba and singing all over the world with the well-known "High Sierra Jazz Band" for over 42 years.

Earl graduated from Woodlake High School in 1949. He was a member of a scrappy group of football players that claimed the San Joaquin Valley Championship for two years running...1947 and '48, quite a feat for such a small town team. In his senior year, Earl was president of FFA and received the prestigious award of State Farmer. (In 1976, this proud honor was also earned by his son known as "Little Earl.") Earl also received the Chamber of Commerce Banker's Agricultural award; he was president of the athletic letterman's "Block W" association and was voted Vice President alongside dear friend and Student Body President, Jess Cox. While attending Fresno State University, Earl played for the Frosh football team. There, he was taught several lessons from two powerful varsity players just out of the Marines; Herman Ziegler and Bud Loverin. (Herman was the boxing heavyweight champion of the Southwest Marine Corps!) Earl faced those two on many scrimmages and they showed him no mercy. With much due respect, here began their lifelong friendship. Twenty years later, Earl served on the Woodlake H.S. The 2018-2019 school year was especially rewarding for everyone within the WHS community. Usually every 6 years, a high school completes a comprehensive selfstudy and then a team commissioned by the Western Association of Schools & Colleges (WASC) reviews the self-study, completes an on-site visit, and affirms whether

what was reported by the school is accurate. If all is in proper order, the school is re-accredited by WASC and most often the school then completes a 3-year progress report and receives another on-site affirmation visit. In June 2019, WHS outstandingly received the highest accreditation level possible; 6-years with no need for a 3-year affirmation visit. Only 1 in 4 schools receive this level of accreditation. In essence, this accreditation level certifies that WHS is not only a quality institu-

tion for student learning but is directed by a school staff that is reflective, self-sufficient and capable of completing its own monitoring and self-improvement process. **WHS Tigers Rising!**

New for 2019-2020, is the establishment of the Engineering Pathway. Students interested in this new pathway will be engaged in hand-on projects related to Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). Introduction to Engineering Principles became a new course offering and is one of a sequence of 3 courses students will complete and obtain knowledge/skills so if interested, can then pursue a STEM related career. By expanding career pathways, WHS is looking forward to learning about the additional successes students will have by offering more opportunities to prepare for college and a variety of careers. *WHS Tigers Rising!*

Nicole "Nikki" Frazier


6th -12th Grade Instructional Coach



"Attending SACNAS will give me not only the opportunity to share my research with others, but to also gain experience and advance my professional career. In addition, I would be able to use my experience to encourage other women and first-generation college students to pursue careers in STEM. As a community college student, it is very common to hear students discuss the opportunities they are excited to participate in once they transfer to four-year universities. Attending SACNAS will give me the ability to show others that despite our position, there are multiple ways to become involved whilst at COS."



(Student Health Advocates for Peer Empowerment) began as an after school club to advocate for Comprehensive Sexual Health Education and Mrs. Lucatero became a strong ally in recruiting students to participate, and talking to students, parents and teachers about the goals of the club.

Blanca is considered a "second mom" by many students. She takes personal care to hear them out, and makes time after school and on weekends to be present for her students. Blanca's classroom is a safe haven for many students who are struggling with depression or bullying. Blanca is a key supporter for trans students and makes it her priority to mentor the entire school community about being accepting of student diversity. Blanca is currently a Spanish Teacher, English Department Chair and Head Cross Country Coach for WHS. WHS and ACT are eternally grateful for Blanca's openness, her courage, and her faith in the work she does in Woodlake together to advocate and advance justice for all young people.
